Dogs and Children

By virtue of being "track dogs", greyhounds generally have not been around children, but most really seem to enjoy being around them. However, there are certain guidelines we ask that you follow so that the adjustment period for you, your children and your foster greyhound goes as smoothly as possible. This adjustment period can last anywhere from 3 to 6 months depending on the individual greyhound and the dedication and patience of the foster family.

No dog is foolproof around children. Just as you would not leave a toddler or infant alone or unsupervised, children of any age should never be left alone or unsupervised with dogs. At first, your new foster greyhound may not understand the concept of children rushing or crawling around, running up to it, or trying to kiss or hug it when it is lying down (even if it is awake!). Your foster greyhound may choose to get up and walk away, do nothing, growl, or it may even snap or bite. Greyhounds sometimes sleep with their eyes open so it can be very difficult to tell if one is asleep or awake. For this reason, it is important that you **DO NOT LET ANY CHILD CRAWL UP TO, RUN UP TO, JUMP ON, KISS, OR HUG A DOG THAT IS LYING DOWN AND/OR SLEEPING.** If there is a need to pet a greyhound that is lying down, call him to you first and then pet him. This way you are assured that the greyhound is fully awake.

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Children should not be permitted to bother the greyhound (or any dog) when it is lying on its bed. This helps give your foster greyhound a place where he can escape from the stresses of everyday life and feel secure. It is not a place for kids to crawl on or lay down on!

When your foster Greyhound is eating, keep the children away. Greyhounds can be very protective of their food. Watch both child and foster Greyhound during play time. Never leave your child and the foster Greyhound together alone. Close supervision is the key to a successful relationship between ANY dog and a child. Also, remember, if you have children running in and out of doors, be sure that the door latches securely so your foster Greyhound cannot push it open. It is very easy for a curious Greyhound to “nose” their way out of an unsecured door and goes running down the street and possibly into traffic.

Greyhound Lifesavers will always reclaim the foster greyhound should your situation change or in the unlikely event that you are unhappy with the dog.
